## **Board of Trustees Report**

#### **Holiday Greetings BFUUers!**

This month, things are happening at a rapid pace. Both our 'three minister plan' and our new Music Director are due to start at the beginning of January, a comprehensive Process of Discernment for Social Justice for the whole Congregation is planned to begin next month (more information on Page 3), and more is to come throughout the year.

As a result of the most recent Presidential election, many of us, especially here in the Bay Area, are feeling that the Winter Solstice is not the only time of darkness that is upon us. Some Christian fundamentalists are accusing anyone wishing "Happy Holidays" of promoting a "War on Christmas"! This seems as good a time as any to recall a time (1659 to 1681) when the very celebration of Christmas was outlawed by the Massachusetts Puritans! That's right, the Puritans believed that on December 25th the stores should be open while the churches remained closed.

In 1832, the Unitarian Minister Charles Follen and his wife Eliza surprised party guests in their Cambridge, Massachusetts home by displaying one of the first Christmas trees to be seen in Massachusetts. Follen was a 'transplant' from Germany who'd brought the indoor tree tradition with him. The idea spread in the colonies and to England, but it would not be until 1856 that Christmas became a public holiday in Massachusetts.

Help for this assaulted holiday came from an unlikely quarter since Unitarians neither believed that Jesus of Nazareth was any more divine than the rest of us, nor thought he was born on the 25th of December. What they did believe was that Christmas should be a time for worship (open the church doors) and for spending time with family away from commerce (close shops, banks, businesses, and even schools.) Once the Puritan plan was reversed, Old Time/Newfangled Christmas began to take shape.

One of the greatest architects of this revamped holiday was, of course, Unitarian author Charles Dickens. All of his writings featured social justice themes and his novel *A Christmas Carol* was no exception. The story of a man who recaptures the true meaning of Christmas seems merely touching until we realize that the story is actually introducing the reading audience of the day to a concept not widely known before the book was published. What better way to introduce a new awareness than to depict a character who has lost his and then recaptures it?

### Social Justice Discernment

BFUU's three-part series to explore, build and reenvision a congregation-wide social justice program. The program led by Evan Junker of the UU Social Justice Ministry of California involves education, discernment, reflection, strategy development and planning. Main components of the program include:

- Reflect and discuss how to help make your social justice program more spiritually grounded in Unitarian Universalist values.
- Develop a vision of your congregation's potential to be a social justice ally in your community.
- Discuss and assess the current status of your congregation's social justice program.
- Discover and plan how to integrate social justice into the larger life of your congregation including worship, religious education, and adult programming.
- Increase the number of people involved in the social justice program.
- Celebrate your congregation's social justice history.

Three congregation level meetings are scheduled for third Sundays, February 19, March 19, and April 16, 2017, in the Fellowship Hall, from 12:30 to 2:30. BFUU's cost for the entire discernment process will be \$1,400. The program will be free of charge to participants. #### **Transition Berkeley Presents: The Root Cause**

The film begins at 7:00 and will be followed by the panel discussion.




