

Community Voices



Across the country UU's are expanding the coalition of people prepared to overcome voter suppression and #votelove in 2020.

In addition to your local work, UU the Vote is planning national days of action every other week from now to election day. If you've been wondering what you can do, forming a team to participate and putting the national phone banks on your calendar is an easy next step.

In Florida, we're partnering with New Florida Majority Education Fund to reach hundreds of thousands of Florida voters. Over one hundred Florida UUs have been phonebanking for the last three weeks, ahead of the state attorney and sheriff primary elections, talking to thousands of voters about police violence against Black people and the need for systemic change. Now we need to bring in UU reinforcements from around the country as we head toward the general election and talk to voters broadly about the stakes in 2020.

In Wisconsin, we joined Wisconsin Voices - a statewide coalition of over 65 organizations committed to progressive values and expanding the electorate by building power in communities that have been divested from & targets of voter suppression through elections and year-round organizing. We'll flank the work of WI Voices partners and fill in gaps - phonebanking priority voters who might not be part of their other organizations' base.

The next phonebank is September 22nd from 7-9 PM ET (4-6 PM PST.) Please sign up here! You'll see sign ups there for all the upcoming phonebanks too.

This is an all hands on deck moment! Please sign up and help us recruit more volunteers. You can forward this message, send people the sign up links, send it to your lists, post in your newsletters, and share the sign up links on Facebook. We have a goal of gathering 500 UUs and friends to make

Be Part of the National Call-in Days to Voters in Wisconsin and Florida

Every other week until election day, UU's from across the country are making non-partisan calls together to register, mobilize, and persuade voters in 2020.

calls in August and September. If everyone recruits 1-2 or even more people we can make and surpass that goal. People understand what a crucial moment we are in, in Florida, Wisconsin, and in our nation.

We hold the phonebanks on Zoom so that we are able to make our phone calls together. We gather in, get oriented, trained in the first 30 minutes or so of the phonebank, make our calls together, and debrief and celebrate our results at the end of the session. Working this way is fulfilling, faithful, and fun as we build solidarity and power for change.

On 3/17/20, the view from my office changed. This is true for many of us, now, as we shelter-in-place (SIP) and do our jobs remotely. It has been quite the adjustment in perspective, too. What does an employee whose job is to manage facility schedules do when those facilities are closed to the public? The answer is to look to the future and preserve our resources.

Childcare and summer camps providing care for workers are permitted to operate under Berkeley's SIP order. Starting in June, the New School ramped up to re-open on July 1st for families of first responders and essential workers. And Seele's Stars, a kids performing arts camp, took up residence in our Hall

for 2 weeks, giving some relief to the restrictions for families of participating children. Both the preschool and the camp are restricted to a "pod" of 12 children. Cleaning & disinfecting are required throughout the day as well at the end of each session. This required custodial assistance!

Fortunately, we had hired a new Sexton/custodian, Shae Jewell, right when SIP started. She arrived in June, got some training, cleaned out the custodial closets, and started off running. We are so fortunate to have her, with years of experience running camps, both in Marin and the Sierras. Shae's good humor, organization, and custodial skills have been a boon to us at a crucial time. We have worked together to create and execute the necessary plans for keeping the kids safe and their environment healthy. "It's good to have a purpose, again," she said. Since New School is now also using the Hall Monday-Friday, Shae has her work cut out for her.

And my view? You can see it in this photo! I've created my home video studio, as all my dulcimer teaching is online, now. As I write, I'm preparing to teach at my 2nd virtual dulcimer festival this year,

with over 200 students to encounter via zoom 8/28-30. My classes through TheFreight.org have helped me come into the digital age, with my 3rd session starting in September.

I wish each of you a safe and fruitful Fall, and the comfort of home, this season.
