# Cleric's Corner



## **Guilt Is a Feeling Designed** to Make Us Pay Attention

The human capacity to adapt replaces our need for fur, big teeth (whether long and sharp or wide and crushing), or being incredibly strong and fast for our size. I wonder if we felt an early equivalency of shame out there on the veldt, as not only the new kids on the block but in some ways the smallest and weakest?

What we developed instead was our remarkable ability to adapt. We somehow have an exceptionally sharp capacity to pay attention to our environment and ourselves. And for some even more mysterious reason, we know to make enough sense of these things to change what we're doing to find a way to make it work. And we do that not just enough to survive but well enough to become a dominant species in this specific environment.

I want to look at today's two points of interest: adapting our environment to ourselves (which is just a fancy way of adapting to the world around us) and cooperation amongst ourselves as part of the whole adaptation.

We were able to out-fox the fox and out-hunt the "king of beasts" (on land or sea) by our capacity to work together. That is how we were able to live on the bison of the Great Plains, which, by the way, may well have been the result of our adapting the environment to ourselves. Some archeologists are coming to believe that the great plains were, at one time, great forested regions and that human inhabitants did here, as in Europa, and leveled them for purposes of their own. Did we feel shame for that?

Moving forward several millennia, we find ourselves continuing in the same behavior that made us a successful survivor in a world where that's not been an easy thing to do. Until recently, nature has considered it a mark of right behavior to continue doing that which has made life work; making it continue and even thrive. Nature grants long rewards to those creatures that can pull that off.

Now, just a few centuries ago (in the face of nature's count), we gained the capacity to span the globe of Spaceship Earth. Now we can move from the eastern side of our bay to the western peninsula and back in a single day

- while engaging in sometimes wholly different activities in between. Such rapidly won capability is nothing short of exceptional or even miraculous. Consider crossing that distance on foot! So that means we've gotten good at myriads of processes that make even such an undertaking (in our current estimation) mundane.

Yet, by fulfilling nature's requirements for success, we feel somehow guilty. Even measured by my lifetime span, I can say that the automobile is a relatively new invention. Its current internal combustion incarnation is more recent still. I can recall when its fuel cost less than 20 cents, as did a loaf of bread. We learn and adapt faster than anything or anyone else we know. Yet we feel guilty for destroying the environment.

Perhaps this peculiar psychological affliction is not as it seems. Maybe this or something like it happens every time we take a great leap forward. Maybe it is a natural reaction that brings into our awareness a need to leap further. Perhaps our guilt is a unique signal, accessible only to us, which tells us we need to develop another significant change.

On the morning of the Red Sky, that day that never came, Gaia tapped me gently on the shoulder to tell me something. She spoke gently but clearly and told me something I'd never expected to hear directly from her. I'll share that with you soon. Spoiler alert: She's not pissed at us, as many may suspect. That's a human understanding. Though this may offend some: she still loves us as much as any of her children.

I include a link below that has little to do with the preceding. Yet, it's connected. It consists of some of the signs from 2015 and before. These might have tipped you off that His-Majesty the Emperor Antichrist would likely win that election. As I've said before, it was my Marketer's logic that was my tip-off. This one comes from a journalist, and his perceptions were not that different from the view a Mad Man (a Madison Avenue marketer) might have had. Watch it at your leisure.

# Social Justice Committee Report

- > Fellowship to approve/ratify at Congregational Meeting and, if done, send to UUA Regional for them to get approval, then to National.
- > 21st century Police Department designed to serve and protect all people.

Police departments are funded by taxpayers and must be held accountable. In order to bring our police departments into the future, cleansed of their current racist, sexist and homo/transphobic structure and culture, to serve and protect ALL people with justice for all, the following changes and adjustments are recommended.

#### PROPOSAL:

- \* Prior to entering the Police Academy, all recruits need to be fully investigated including their high school and college backgrounds and whether they have been involved in domestic or other violence. Applicants should undergo psychological evaluations, including racial and other bias screening, prior to being hired.
- \* If hiring combat veterans, trained to "shoot to kill," or any recruit who was abused as a child, assure that they do not have Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD.)
- \* Establish a national database for decertified police officers and a national database of police shootings and use of force, broken down by demographics. Screen all applicants on both databases.
- \* Establish local databases that include the dollar amount of court award damages and settlements (taxpayer monies) for police misconduct of each officer.
- \* Who recruits and where? It should not be the same group that processes hiring.
- \* End qualified immunity and enact full ACCOUNTABILITY for police violence and brutality.
- \* Eliminate Urban Shield which allocates funding for military equipment to civilian law enforcement.
- \* Replace police with mental health workers/citizen response teams trained in conflict de-escalation for 911 calls requesting help with mental health issues, including domestic violence.

We all want to live in a peaceful loving community.

We want our police to serve and protect our entire community.
