April 3: How to Dance in a Hurricane

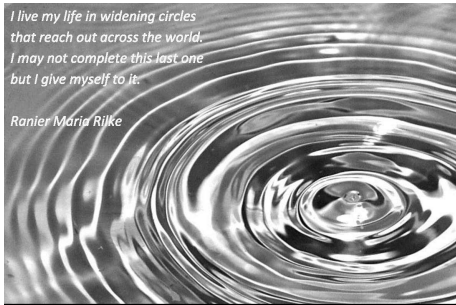

Dear BFUUers,

We are midway through our process of discernment, designed to guide us through our understanding about who we want to be and how we want to express that internally and outwardly over the next five to ten years. We have explored and practiced non-violent communication with careful guesses and expression of needs and sociocracy as a new way of decision-making in an inclusive and thoughtful way. There has been great turnout of almost half of our membership at each weekend, with energy, focus and courage for trying new things.

We are only just at the beginning of this new path and as we continue we need determination to keep on keeping on – practicing new behaviors with patience and meeting challenges with perseverance for the love of the community that is BFUU. How many of us felt that to practice non-violent communication requires inner awareness, outer awareness of the other, and skillfulness to express needs and desires accurately and with care? Was it worth the effort? Most important to me is that we practice what we profess to believe on principle: the inherent dignity of every human being. Growing our capacity to see the “other” as another human being, not the enemy, if we disagree or make mistakes. This is not always easy.

A whole other level of challenge has to be faced to maintain inner and outer awareness, express ourselves clearly, AND attend to the elements of decision-making using a new process! We have so many opportunities to use the Circle Meeting and other sociocratic processes in our many committee, task force, and Board meetings! No time like the present. As with any new skill set, having a beginner’s mind, self-compassion, empathy for others, and a willingness to step into the Unknown will be our greatest allies.

Our Working Groups – Structural Transitions, Vision/Mission/Aims and Beloved Community – will continue to work individually this month, but also in a new structure called the Integration Council. Each group informs and draws on the experience and decisions of the others. Having this integration increases our chances of making fruitful, effective, and inclusive moves forward, while building community. They will make their proposals to the group-at-large at our next weekend together, April 8-10.

Board of Trustees Report, continued

There are several things about our process of discernment I am very excited about: while we continue to show up, try new things, and be kind to ourselves and others, we are connecting ever more, stretching our ability to communicate, and finding better ways of making decisions. This adds up to growing into a more cohesive community, growing as leaders, and stretching ourselves spiritually. Please join us!

This past weekend we had our second of three planned Discernment Process/Beloved Community weekends.

Our next planned weekend is **April 8th-10th**; please let Pam (pcnorton@yahoo.com), Nanci or Frankie know if you plan to attend and inform us of any dietary restrictions or allergies, or you can tell Susan in the BFUU office and she will pass along the info to us.

Many of you were able to attend and get the benefit of the training and space-holding of our facilitators, Gregory and Jared of Living Seven Principles.

Many of you who were unable to attend the Saturday workshop were present at the **Friday night** open mic night, where the discernment Beloved Community weekend began with a community dinner and attendance at the open mic night.

And still more of us attended the Sunday service led by Gregory and members of the Discernment Task Force.

Thank you to everyone who came, participated, or sent their warm regards to those who could come.

We have a few actionable steps which we decided upon. These are:

- 1) the creation of working groups (which happened at the first weekend).
- 2) the creation of an integration council to collect the work of the working groups (which was decided this past weekend).
- 3) the continued communication between the working groups, the BFUU board, and the wider community.

Our next proposal is to form the integration council, which will meet at least once between now and the next Discernment Process/Beloved Community weekend.

Proposed next steps for formation of the Working Groups Integration Council:

1. For an initial meeting of the Integration Council (IC) a temporary committee will assemble for the purpose of determining HOW the IC will function. Specifically, what authority it will have, what processes it will use, and how it will be inclusive and representative of all the working groups.

This committee will be made up of:

1-2 people from each Working Group,

1 Discernment Task Force Member

1 Member of the Board.

2. Working Groups within a week will determine which members they wish to send to this initial (IC) meeting

3. Within 2 weeks of the Working Groups determining which members they are sending, the Council of Integration will gather to decide its structure, process, and authority.

Memo from the BFUU Office

Social Justice Watch

Members of the SJC have been active in trying save Berkeley's rich diversity and unique architectural heritage.

At risk of destruction are the Shattuck Cinema, Ace Hardware, and historical buildings all over Berkeley, which are threatened by development projects that are changing the look of Berkeley. Kelly Hammergren, one of our BFUU SJC 2016 Thomas Paine Awardees, is suing the City of Berkeley to stop the Harold Way Project, which will destroy the Shattuck Cinema and the Habitot children's center, and allow an 18-story luxury condominium to be built on an historical landmarked block. The building, which in addition to not being very "green", is not affordable for anyone other than the wealthy. This highrise, right in the heart of Berkeley, will shadow our beautiful public library and disrupt the learning environment at Berkeley High School for the several years it is under construction. The sound of pile drivers, clouds of asbestos dust, traffic gridlock and congestion, and huge trucks, cranes, and construction materials will be our reward for the Berkeley City Council and Mayor voting to allow the developers to build this huge project. There doesn't seem to be any benefit to the Berkeley community in the Harold Way Project.

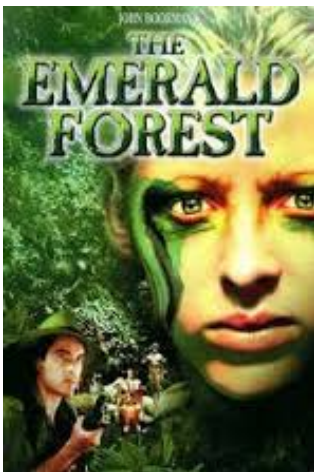

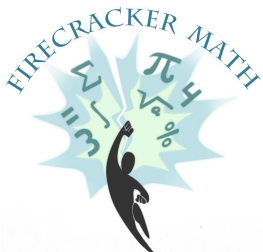

Spiritual Growth and Social Justice in the Heart of Berkeley
