Sylvia Scherzer (alternate), Recording Sec'y A lot has happened in the last two months! Our budget is set in place to carry us through the coming year and we have new structures in place to help support our membership and many services left unaddressed until now.

Our budget has been revised and approved for 2015-16, to include duties usually performed by our minister: ministerial guest speakers for Sunday Services, pastoral care services, right relations services, and a discernment process to make decisions about our fellowship's directions going forward. We also approved much needed buildings and grounds maintenance and repairs, including a new roof (already on!) and substructure for future solar panels, and Fellowship Hall retrofitting solutions.

As I understand it, the Caring Committee is currently in the process of hiring a temporary pastoral care minister for fellowship members in need, especially those members with health and/or mobility issues.

As many of you know, on Sunday, September 13th, we held the first of what is hopefully a series of process of discernment meetings from 1-4 p.m. in Fellowship Hall, with Marlena Willis as facilitator. Members responded to questions about what has and has not worked in the past for our fellowship, what we are currently wanting to have happen, and how we can structure and further our discernment process with outside facilitators. As a next step, UU facilitator Jared Finkelstein of Living the Seven Principles (http:// livingseven principles.com) will attend our next Board meeting (9/24/15) and come to coffee hour after our 9/27/15 Sunday Service so that we can talk with him about how his organization might help us navigate the discernment process over the next year. Discernment Task Force Report

About 30 members participated in the discernment process workshop we conducted Sunday, September 13th, in the afternoon after the service and potluck. We provided child care for three children.

We talked about where we come from (BFUU history-have we been effective in our fellowship and our surrounding community?) what we are (studied our vision and mission statements-are we who we say we are?) and where are we going (what comes next for BFUU?)

There were many findings from the day, that are being collected into a document that will be available to the congregation. One important one is that most members felt that the vision and mission statements need to be revisited and most likely revised to reflect a more concise and relevant statement about who we are and what we do.

The Discernment Task Force asked for help from the congregation for the process. The congregation is willing to have help from outside facilitators and would like the opportunity to meet and research those facilitators before they are hired for a more in-depth process. The DTF recommended a team consisting of Jared Finkelstein and Gregory Rouillard of Living Seven Principles (website link below), with Marlena Willis as a third facilitator and helper in this process. The congregation has already met and worked with Marlena. Jared, representing both himself and Gregory, is planning to attend the board meeting Thursday and has also been invited to attend coffee hour after the service Sunday.

If there is no objection after Sunday, and if the facilitators are available, we would like to start planning a beloved community weekend and/or other events on November 7th and 8th to continue the discernment process. The focus of that workshop/weekend would be Mission and Vision.

In the meantime, we encourage all members to participate as much as possible in congregational activities and leadership opportunities wherever possible. Attending committee meetings, services, small groups and social/action events help build our skills and our communities. Some useful resources for leadership development:




