A Message From Developmental Minister Reverend Theresa Novak

I am very excited that I will be serving as your developmental minister beginning 8/15/14. It will be in some senses a homecoming for me as I am a native Californian and lived in the Bay Area most of my life, including quite a few years in Berkeley. My wife and I actually got together back in 1975 at a dance held at the fellowship.

Developmental ministry is something you have not experienced before; it is actually rather new within Unitarian Universalism so you are not alone. I hope you are ready for something really different and that you will come to embrace it with real enthusiasm.

Your board and I have agreed that our mutual and overall goal for this developmental ministry over the next 3-5 years will be to “catalyze the transformation of BFUU into a sustainable and vibrant congregation, capable of thriving in a challenging future.”

You are right if you think that is an ambitious goal. You have a very proud history and many strong points, but your membership numbers have not been increasing and you have been spending down your endowment. That is simply not sustainable over the long term.

As your current members age and your money runs out, will BFUU eventually just cease to exist? I know none of you want that to happen, and neither do I. The city of Berkeley needs and deserves a thriving and vibrant liberal religious community, one that makes a real difference for its membership and for the surrounding area.

In order to become that kind of place, BFUU will, at the very least, need to attract additional new and enthusiastic people who will be just as passionate and dedicated to Unitarian Universalism and social justice as you have been.

It can be done. It will likely require some changes in how you do things, however, and change is always hard. My role as your developmental minister will be to help you with whatever changes may need to happen. I don't have a blueprint or a list of specifics, but I do already have a few ideas. When I arrive next August, I will work with your leadership and the congregation as a whole to develop a plan that will take you to where you want to go.

What happens with that plan will ultimately be up to you. I will offer you advice and counsel as we go along and I will argue vigorously for you to be courageous and bold. I will hold your hands when you get scared, and I will cheer you on when you are brave enough to try something new. We will celebrate when we succeed.

Start dreaming now about things you might like to try. We will be in full experimental mode for a time until we figure out what will work best.

I have been in communication with your current interim minister, the Reverend Joy Atkinson. From what I have heard, you have done some very good work with her and are now ready to move forward with some energy and enthusiasm.

In the meantime, I ask you to have the faith that we will do this. BFUU will create a vision of its future that is meaningful and real and then we will make that vision come alive. Remember, too, that faith is much more than just “wishing and hoping.” At the very least, faith requires confidence and the willingness to act.

Friends of Bob Randolph

Many Fellowship folks have known Bob Randolph for a long time—from poetry readings in our hall and other venues, to his daily rounds in the Shattuck & Vine neighborhood near his home. Those of us who hung out at local coffee shops saw Bob as regularly as clockwork. He always had a witticism, a new poem, or one of his books to offer.

At 93, Bob can no longer walk or speak clearly and has moved to a board-and-care home in Albany, where he shares his poems and humor with housemates.

On June 4th Bob received the North Berkeley Senior Center’s first Poet Laureate Award at the monthly Elder Voices meeting hosted by Joan Gatten. We gathered around him in his wheelchair, read some of his poems, and spoke of our friendship with the poet.

Joan says, “Bob Randolph, his wit, awareness, and poetry are so important to me that I started the Elder Voices series so that the community would continue to hear his voice and . . . the voices of our community of elders.” If you’d like to be in touch with Bob, or to become a “Friend of Bob Randolph,” Joan Gatten has lots of ways to do that. Fran Franks has been active in the professional music scene since the early seventies, coming of musical age in the days she refers to as the golden age of live music when all the Southern California clubs had live music and the only DJs were on the radio. Her burgeoning career was cut short by her developing blindness in 1990, and she subsequently went back to school to pursue a masters degree, and has since been working in a professional career. Experiencing a musical re-awakening in 2011, she decided to re-enter the professional music scene.

Re-equipping in both technique and technology to master her circumstances, she formed the power trio Pandora's Hammer which is now rockin' the Bay Area with a unique sound based on Fran's mastery of the state of the art Fractal AXE FX 2 signal processor.

Conscientious Projectors Film Series: *The Day After Trinity: Oppenheimer and the Atomic Bomb*

Conscientious Projector's Film Series for the 99% presents *The Day After Trinity: Oppenheimer and the Atomic Bomb*. "I have become Death" declared nuclear scientist J. Robert Oppenheimer upon first witnessing the terrible power of the Atomic Bomb. This Oscar -nominated film for best documentary uses newsreel footage and recently declassified government film to trace the Manhattan project under Oppenheimer's guidance. The New Mexico A-Bomb tests are shown as well as the aftermath of the Hiroshima and Nagasaki bombings. The final part traces Oppenheimer's journey as the "Father of the A-Bomb" to a tireless oponent of nuclear power and ironically a "national security threat."
