Board of Trustees Report

Dear BFUUers,

Celebrations are in order at this, the end of our fiscal year and the term for several outgoing Board members, including Ben Burch, Lis Schultze-Allen and myself. It has been a very eventful and full year in many different ways for BFUU. It has been my honor (and even my pleasure) to serve as Board President since the end of April 2015.

We had many issues to face when Reverend Theresa resigned and all of us had to handle the various duties covered by a minister: writing and delivering services, helping to shape and lead Sunday services, doing pastoral care, supervising personnel, volunteers, and potential seminary interns, representing our congregation in the community at large, cheerleading stewardship, and so many other responsibilities. Actually, it seems like that began a really long time ago, probably because so much has happened in one year! I will not have space or time to relate all of them, but here are some that stand out in my mind.

First, thank you to the current and past Board members for the 2015–16 year: Doug Chambers as Vice-President, Ben Burch as (long-time) Treasurer, several Secretaries—Holly Harwood, Syl Scherzer, and now Lis Schultze-Allen—and other board members and alternates, Nanci Armstrong-Temple, Frankie Hill, and Mike Gardner. We have met for board meetings, leadership development meetings, and a board retreat. We also met on many other committees and task forces. I will treasure the camaraderie gained from so much work, laughter and song. Second, thanks to the office personnel, Susan (I've Got That! And This!) Macke and Deborah Hamouris (welcome back!), as well as Lynn Orlando, who filled in so deftly for Deborah. Thanks to all the Committee members who do so much work behind the scenes (as we all do).

Buildings and Grounds got our new roof installed and began work on the retrofitting of our sanctuary. We should have our new rolling cart for chairs and some new chairs available soon. The Aesthetics sub-committee is in the process of coordinating the repair of and new additions to the banners that Reverend

Jeremy Taylor created so long ago and which have become an integral part of our sanctuary space—they are on the way, after many setbacks.

The Sunday Services Committee stepped up to find even more than usual lay leaders and eventually a number of regular ministers to lead a service each month or so, and brilliantly created a holding space for inspiring, creative, thoughtful, and often humorous services. Marsh Agobert, Reverend Meg, Reverend Carrie, and several of our own Sunday Services Committee members, including Jean Marie Stine, Joanna Foley and Jeff Palmer, led memorable services. Certainly, I will never forget the service led by The Conspiracy of Beards, which was unusual, soulful and delightfully different. I do wish we had videotapes of them all. Dominic has been our choir director and sound person all year in the midst of many challenges and how those two happened at the same time is beyond my understanding. Thank you Dominic for your service and thank you for all who are learning to handing the sound system tasks, and to Susan Mashiyama for taking on the choir and music with verve and grace. Susan, Andy Jamieson and many others have provided beautiful music to buoy up our services.

The Caring Committee proposed hiring, and hired, a minister to handle pastoral care: Reverend Dr. Carrie Knowles—who, besides holding office hours, has facilitated the Elders Circle and started the Good Grief group. Hospitality, Membership and Caring (or HMC) has made sure we have good food, good welcome, follow-up connection with new and old members and friends, very welcome cards for milestones in our lives, and get-well cards that have made many people glad to be remembered as integral parts of our community.

The Social Justice Committee continues to do what it does so well: provide a space for many social justice community events and information on a multitude of topics through the Conscientious Projector film series; integrate with other social justice groups in our community, and participate in any number of social justice issues at the drop of a hat, in addition to organizing them. One of the reasons so many people know our building is because of the events SJC conducts regularly. We had the new marathon Protest Music event that went on all day, with many musicians, poets, and general rabble-rousing from morning to mid-evening. SJC consistently raises more money for BFUU than any other group outside of our rental income.

The RE Committee continues to provide a place for growth and learning for our younger members, and has branched out to provide separate classes for the pre-teens. Kathy Riehle led the Stewardship Committee and provided a well-attended luncheon to kick off the pledge drive for the new year. There are so many other services that others have provided with dedication. I am very conscious that I am not listing them all, but their effects have been very palpable.

A major event for our community was the weekend workshop series for the Process of Discernment from February through April of this year. The Process of Discernment Task Force was led by Nanci Armstrong-Temple, who, along with all Board members, spent time and energy and discernment to choose Living the Seven Principles consultants Gregory Rouillard and Jared Finkelstein to lead us through the process. Learning about non-violent communication through activities rather than theoretical discussions, and focusing directly on issues that concerned us most this year, was stimulating, instructive, and has proven helpful ever since for those who fully engaged in the process. We worked on Vision, Mission, and Aims as the driving force and foundation for all that we do at BFUU. We began to learn to listen to each other thoughtfully, in

order to hear our collective and individual needs at BFUU, and to separate those needs from the strategies we sometimes get fixated on to the detriment of purposeful and effective action. We learned about the Circle Meeting Format and how to use it fruitfully to both hear each person's concerns and unite around common needs and goals. Many committees are now practicing the Circle Meeting structures, including the Board. Thank you Nanci, and the PD Task Force, for organizing and carrying through the many tasks needed to make this process happen. And thank you to the Interim Right Relations Committee, which contributed to the budget of the PDTF as part of its mission to promote connection and healthy relationship.

Out of the Process of Discernment came our three Working Groups: Vision, Mission and Aims, Structural Transitions, and Beloved Community. It was so inspiring to see how many more people became involved in these groups than would usually participate in such central issues, and how much dedication and time was put into each working group by its participants. From the whole process of discernment in which the majority of the congregation participated, to the formation of working groups, we have seen leadership emerge and develop across much of our congregation. In the face of difficulties that came about from the sudden changes in mid-April of last year, we have been actively developing, and healing through, a belief in what we stand for; a willingness to learn and to change; participation from every direction; initiative, and courage.

What I have learned from my time as Board President is that I can shut down and/or withdraw when confronted with adversity (my old habitual modus operandi) or I can take heart and open up to what is. I learned that there is so much more going on behind the scenes than I had ever imagined (or wanted to imagine). Learning to accept criticism, remembering to take deep breaths, and sharing responsibility are three things I gained from this year. If we love our community—and I know there is so much love in this community—I believe that all of us showing up and doing what we can, making mistakes, and learning from them, will lead us to new places and new solutions. Growth happens when we are present and open to service and connection. Thank you for this opportunity to grow in connection to you all. Meanwhile, back at the ranch, I am now co-chair of the Interim Right Relations Committee and hope to participate in the new Small Group Ministry program. You will see me around.

While we continue to learn how to bring burgeoning ideas from the various working groups into a functional whole using these new structures and processes—such as caring communication and inclusive governance methods; the three-minister and Ministerial Coordination Committee proposal (from Structural Transitions); Small Group Ministry; ongoing non-violent communication trainings and practice groups (proposed by Beloved Community); and a social justice discernment process—all covered under Vision, Mission and Aims—the new Board will oversee and guide us toward completion with full input of the congregation in the new year beginning in July. Good luck to the new Board and all Committee members. May you all grow in love and service.

Pick Up

Something was wrong with our furnace, and a man came to fix it, and I watched him.

And when he had it all fixed, he went to light the newspapers that start the wood and the coal burning, but he spilled his matches all over the floor.

So he stooped down, and picked up all his matches with one hand till his hand was all full of matches.

"You're not supposed to pick things up that way," I said. "You should pick them up one at a time."

"Oh, yeah?" said the man.

I told him,
"Whenever I spill my crayons,
my mother says, 'Pick them up one at a time,
and put each one back in the box,
before you pick up the next one."
But the man had all his matches in one hand,
and he put them all back in the box at once.

I really don't think he understood me.



C. Tom Ross was born in 1940 in Wheeling, West Virginia, a center of the steel industry before becoming part of the Rust Belt. He grew up in a close family, with two younger sisters.

At age 10, he was diagnosed with a painful neuromuscular condition, generalized torsion dystonia. This led to two brain surgeries, and later he became a wheelchair user.

In the '60s, he earned his first Masters degree at Union Theological Seminary, New York City, and went on to teach at historically black Clark College in Atlanta. He was active in the Civil Rights and anti-war movements. He took part in the 1963 March on Washington and the 1967 siege of the Pentagon. In the '90s and 2000s, he was active in the disability rights movement.

In 1968, he moved to San Francisco, where he earned his second Masters degree, in Creative Writing, at San Francisco State University. He was a featured reader in many venues in the San Francisco Bay Area, and had prose and poetry published in more than a dozen books and literary journals. He made his home in Berkeley, where he was often seen scooting around in his wheelchair.

C. Tom Ross passed away on May 6th of this year.


Save the Trees
